MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



The past winter was very long with a record snowfall. As a consequence, our spring was problematic – road washouts on Chêne Rouge and minor road damage here and there. However, when I think of the extensive flooding along the Gatineau and Ottawa Rivers, the level of disruption we faced across our nine lakes was minor indeed. A big thank you is extended to the Municipality's public works team for their quick action to reopen our roads where washouts and flooding occurred.

As I write this message, the warm weather of summer has not yet arrived but the black flies have. As terrible as they are, I have observed gardeners working and cultivating “salad bars” for our deer, and fishers angling for the elusive trout. We are a tough bunch and will be ready for summer when it eventually comes!

Water testing for transparency and phosphorus took place just after “ice out” and results have come back from the laboratory. There are no major changes to report, which is excellent; these results can be found on our website as always. Volunteers will test for *E-coli* in late July or early August, by which time the really warm temperatures will have come.

Volunteers have also begun to plan for our Regatta and BBQ, scheduled for August 3. This is always a fun event for children, with swimming and boating competitions with prizes. In previous years we capped off the evening with a “boar roast” but we have noticed a decline in attendance, with the result of “too much boar and not enough people.” The menu this year will be “Double D”: Downsized and Delicious. Stand by for more information as the event nears. We will also be calling for volunteers to assist both with the regatta and the DD feast. Please heed the call – it's a great way to meet your neighbours from across the lakes.

And last but not least, I am reminding you all of our Annual General Meeting on July 21, to be held in the library (rain or shine) opposite Le Marché Richelieu. Both our Mayor, Mr. Jacques Laurin, and Councillor, Mr. Claude Bergeron, will be in attendance. They are great supporters of the Association and are keen to answer questions that any of you may have, and to speak of news and events within the Municipality.

MESSAGE FROM OUR MUNICIPAL COUNCILLOR



Dear fellow residents of Domain Perkins-sur-le-lac,
First of all, I would like to wish you a good summer season, which, hopefully, will cheer us up after this long six-month winter.

As you know, our Municipality and many others in Quebec and Ontario have been affected by the flooding caused by melting snow and heavy rains. Up to 31 roads were closed and, at the time of writing, some roads and one bridge were still closed, as they had not yet been deemed safe.

Chemin du Chêne Rouge has also been affected by Mother Nature and work will be done to repair it. As a result of the floods, our services, and particularly the public works department, were especially overloaded, resulting in a significant delay in the work normally carried out at this time of year.

Many of you responded to the call for help in recruiting volunteers to fill sandbags for disaster victims. On behalf of the Municipality and the victims, I would like to thank you warmly for your help. Approximately 14,000 sandbags were filled.

On another subject, the results of the home composting program are very encouraging and put the Municipality in a good position to reduce waste destined for landfills by 40 percent. The other Municipalities in the MRC des Collines now want to use our composting program because the options they have chosen have not been very successful. Although there was some resistance to the disposal of compost materials, people adapted, as illustrated by the results obtained. However, an analysis shows that vacationers could do even better. I therefore encourage you to use your composters and recycling bins as often as possible. Together, we will achieve the objectives set by the provincial government.

The Environment and Urban Planning Department is currently conducting a pilot project that will reduce the amount of residual materials. The "biodigester" transforms food waste into natural components, i.e., water, carbon dioxide and negligible residues. The outdoor unit, which is heated by the sun, accepts all food waste including meat, fish, bones, dairy products, vegetables and fruit. To learn more about the biodigester, visit www.compostec.ca. More info will be provided in the coming weeks.

And... Last year, our fire department began offering 24/7 service with firefighters on duty, reducing response time by half. This new service should eventually allow you to save a little on your insurance costs. In addition, the firefighters of Fire Hall No. 2 are now installed in their new fire station, which is located next to City Hall. Renovation work on City Hall has also been completed. Outdoor excavation work is expected to be completed shortly and the official opening of City Hall and the new north barracks is scheduled for the fall. Work will begin next on the south barracks, which will be located on chemin Saint-Joseph just east of Perkins Church.

I would like to conclude by reassuring you about the Municipality's debt ratio. It is below average and the Municipality's financial health is very good.

I look forward to seeing you at the Association's festivities.

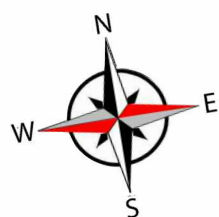
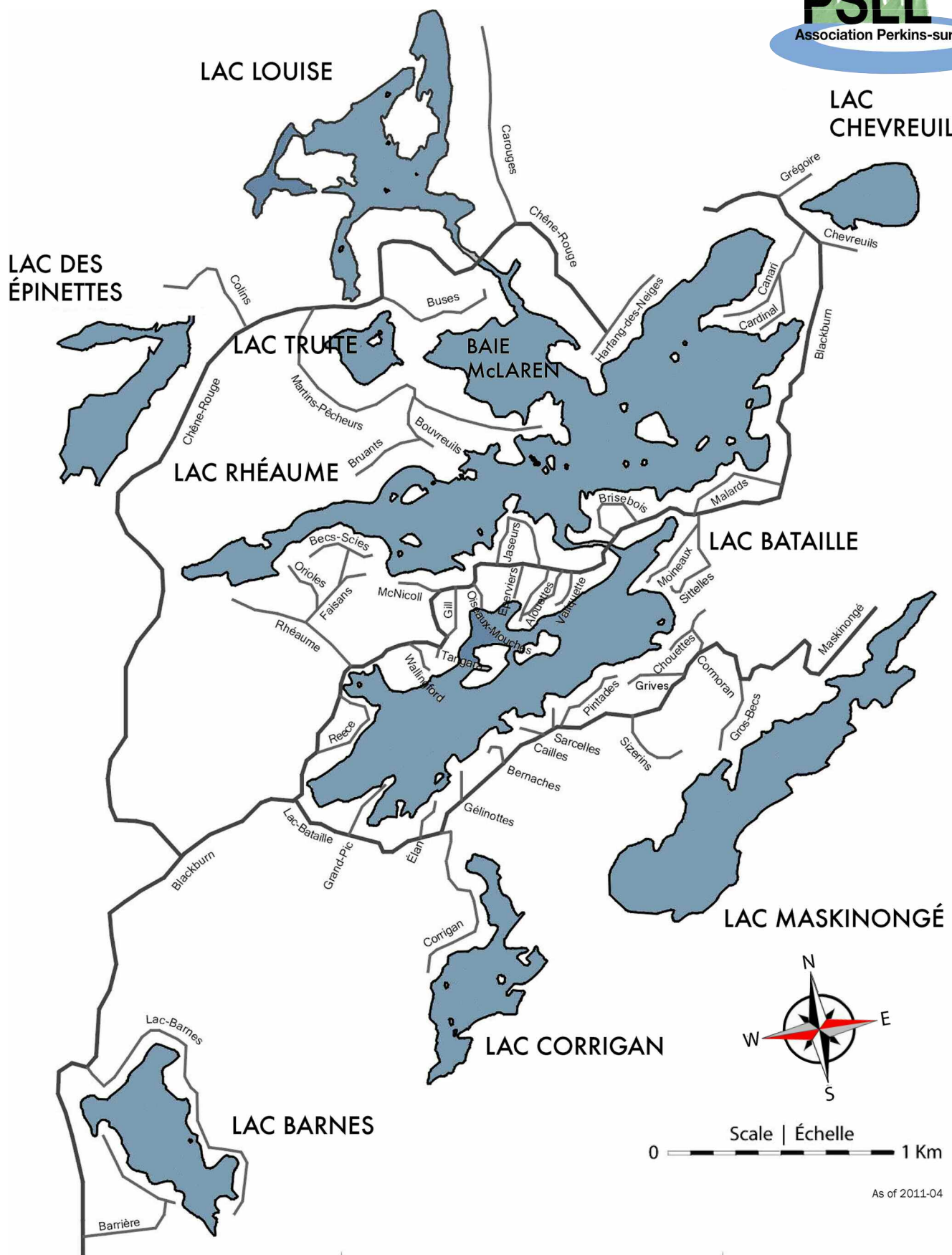

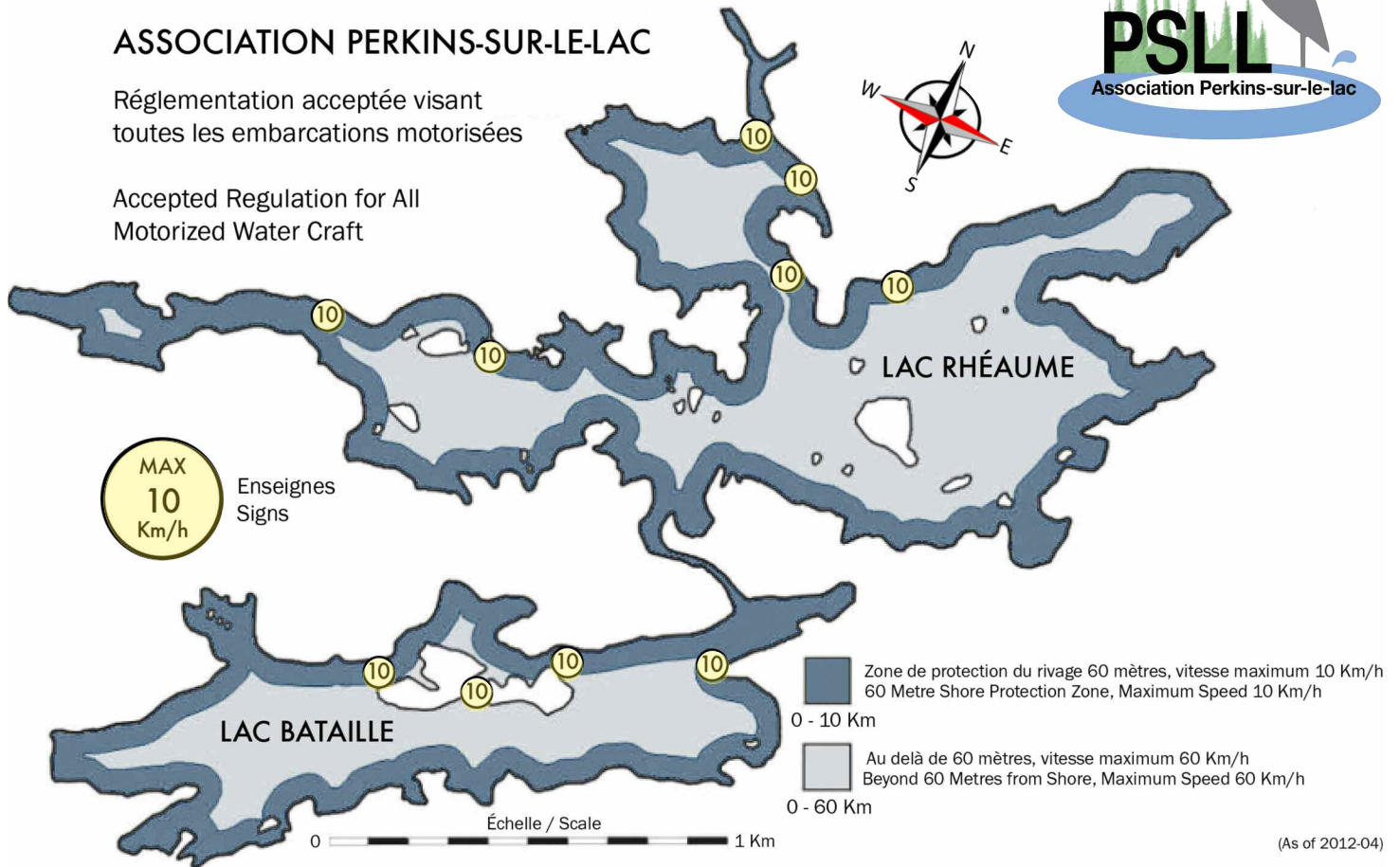

BOAT LAUNCH ACCESS AT LAC BATAILLE

All nine lakes within the Domain are private and not open to public. Consequently, the lac Bataille boat launch is locked throughout the year. However, we have volunteers available to open the gate during the trout fishing season, April 26 to September 15, 2019. If you need to launch or remove your boat during this period, please review the checklist below and then call one of the persons listed.

- Make arrangements 24 hours in advance.
- Only PSLL members who are owners of property on lac Rhéaume or lac Bataille, or who have grandfathered access rights as decided per Association PSLL, are allowed to use the boat launch.
- Members in good standing are admitted free of charge. Non-members must pay \$45 – the cost of an annual membership. Payment by cash or cheque (payable to Association PSLL) may be given to the volunteer key holder at the gate.
- Owners who rent their cottage must be PSLL members in good standing in order to allow tenants access to the boat launch.
- Personal water craft (jet skis) and wake boats will not be admitted.
- Check your bilge and empty it well away from any body of water. Bilge water picked up elsewhere can contaminate our lake(s) with a variety of problem organisms (such as milfoil).

ATTENTION BOATERS

There is a great deal of enjoyment in swimming, fishing, water skiing, tubing, and using our lakes and shores for all kinds of safe recreation and leisure. Association PSLI promotes the safety of boaters and others who use our lakes, and advocates for the protection of the aquatic environment and shoreline. Please reduce your speed near swimmers and obey the regulations while meeting or passing other watercraft, including sailboats, canoes, kayaks and windsurfers.

Remember, everyone on board your pleasure craft must have – and should wear – a Canadian-approved and appropriately-sized flotation device (either a life jacket or personal flotation device) that is in good condition.

Wake boats and personal water craft will not be given access to the boat ramp. This ban is in no way meant to restrict or limit recreational boating, which has been a feature of our three largest lakes. Recreational boating is welcomed and drivers are reminded to be courteous, respectful of the environment, of the rule of law, and obey posted speed zones along our lakes.

Wake Boats: Fun for a Few but Damage for All

Wake boats are increasingly problematic for waterways throughout North America. A quick Google search will yield a range of articles about their negative impact and attempts to control them. Here within PSLI lakes we experience only a few such craft and will not launch them at the Association's boat launch on lac Bataille.

Wake boats are essentially hollow boats with a bladder – the bladder is filled with 1,500 to 2,000 lbs. of water to lower the boat in the water. Further, the horsepower range of these boats is similar to those offered for Volvo tractor-trailer trucks. This combination of weight and power creates waves that are up to one metre high even at modest speeds and it takes over 150 metres on either side of the boat for the waves to dissipate. Fun for the skier, but serious damage for everyone else.

On bodies of water such as our Great Lakes, where expanse and distance are not an issue, wake boats are less of a problem. On lakes of our size, they are extremely destructive. The waves that are generated slam into shorelines and cause significant erosion – erosion that would otherwise have taken decades. And with shoreline damage, nesting areas for our loons are at risk. Also, floating docks are damaged, and there have been instances when persons sitting or standing on docks have been upended. The hyper-wave effects also disturb the bottom lands of the lake and tend to keep lake waters churned up, which imperils the natural aquatic balance.

Is there a “legal” solution? Can regulations be established to control wake boats and where they can be used? The Canadian Shipping Act, which controls navigable water, is not useful in this context. The Act dates back to the turn of the century and was not conceived to protect the environment – its prime purpose is to protect the rights of navigators and to minimize barriers to navigation. The Act also makes it very difficult for a local government to obtain federal approval for a new regulatory proposal – up to five years from the time the request is made to when it might be approved.

Nonetheless, the Coalition of Responsible and Sustainable Navigation was officially created on September 2018 in Saint-Faustin-Lac-Carre, Quebec. We salute them and will watch their progress with interest. In the interim, Association PSLI will continue to ban the launch of wake boats at sites that it controls and strongly encourages our residents to operate and use only conventional watercraft for boating recreation.

Fishing Season is Here!

There's nothing better than a day spent fishing – but only if you have your license and know the rules and regulations! 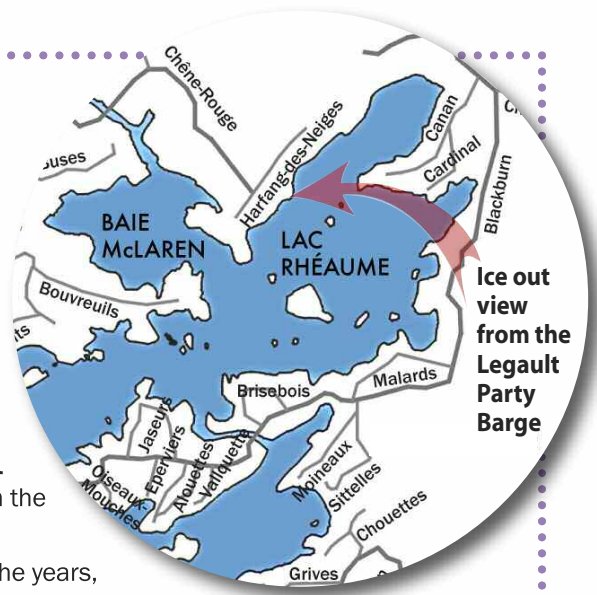
Lac Rhéaume Ice-Out 2019

This year the ice went out on Rhéaume North on Saturday, 4 May, one day earlier than last year. Remarkably, this is 13 days later than the April 22 average and it is one day short of the previous 26 year record for the latest ice-out. But that is not the whole story.

Our little 26 year data set is much too small and too local a sample to draw any planet-wide climate change conclusions. Nevertheless, the revised trend line now tips much more steeply toward later ice-out dates. While it remains to be seen whether this trend will continue into the future, if it is sustained, it would indicate cooling, not warming. However, the revised data now shows a larger standard deviation of 8.0 days, up from 7.7 days last year. This is an indicator of increasing annual volatility which is fully consistent with the expectations of the best climate change science.

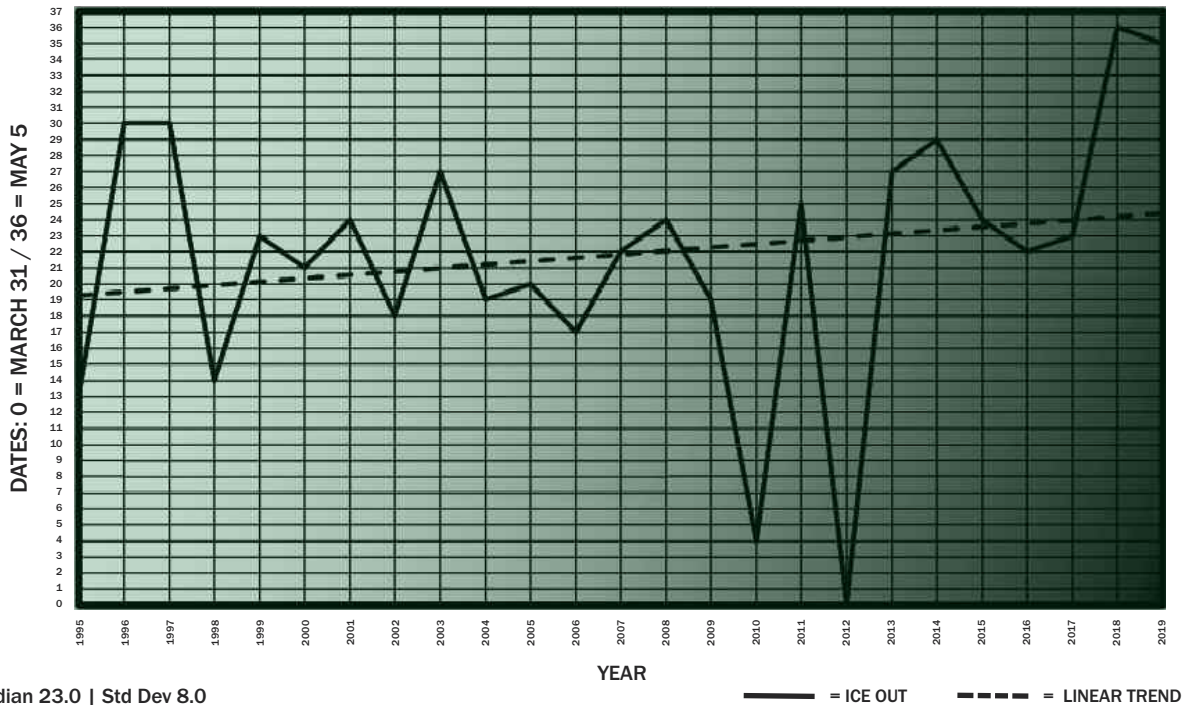

When we look at our Association Map of our nine lakes (*on page 3 of this newsletter*), we see a spider web of roads, mostly private and some Municipal. The Association is often asked “Who maintains the roads? They need repair – who do I call?”.

The answer for the Municipal roads is clear – our taxes pay for the maintenance of these roads. The answer for the private roads is also clear – the Quebec Civil Code states that the users of the road are responsible for their upkeep. **USER PAYS.** This is why PSLL has a long-standing assistance program for its members to help with the cost of road maintenance. Details of this program can be found on our website, www.psll.ca. Volunteer “road committees” can apply for minor assistance for the costs of repair (gravel, grading, culverts – but not winter plowing) for roads that are owned by the Association and where the majority of owners are paid-up members of the Association. The Association also continues to pay and is responsible for all taxes and insurance coverage for the roads it owns.

Another question that is asked is “Why does the Municipality not take over these private roads so that the Association is no longer burdened with them?”. As usual, what seems like a simple question does not yield a simple answer. A quick look at the “spider web” of small roads on our Association map and a drive along the roads established 50 years ago by the original developer will show very small lots and a tight concentration of cottages/homes – waterfront properties that would NOT be approved today. Therefore, if the current Municipal standards for road width with easements on both sides were to be overlaid on these roads, they would encroach significantly on the existing properties and homes. Some properties would be cut in half or disappear.

Mr. Claude Bergeron, our Councillor and a resident within our Domain, has explained to us that over and above the loss of property that some of our owners would suffer, this loss would have to be covered by expropriation costs as payment to the owners, and millions in construction expenses would be needed to bring these roads to Municipal standard. This is not a priority for the Municipality which must, by right, focus on maintaining existing roads under its responsibility and expanding roads where traffic patterns and development require it. The millions that would be needed to “Municipalize” our roads are not budgeted for now nor in long-term plans.

This is just fine as far as Association PSLL is concerned. We prefer to maintain the “bucolic and rustic” atmosphere of our lakes – we don’t want to be the “suburbs” just yet! Let the peace and quiet of nature prevail. But this also means that if the road you use to access your property needs improvement, pick up your shovel, call your neighbour with a shovel, call local gravel suppliers, and spend a weekend helping out. It’s the “community way.”



NEW PSLL SIGNAGE

At the last two AGMs, members asked if the Association could perhaps replace the old rotting wooden PSLL signs at the major intersections. When Jens, the Association’s treasurer, heard that his old boss was now the CEO of the biggest traffic sign manufacturer in Germany, he contacted him.

In the spring of this year, Jens and treasurer Jeff were able to finally install the signs after the long winter. At the same time, a group of lac Rhéaume volunteers led by Scott Windsor decided to repaint the old Domain Chêne Rouge sign.

Good work, everyone!

“Blue Moon”: (from page 9) The correct answer is D.

Sky & Telescope magazine and Wikipedia both actually accept all three definitions given in answers A, B and C.

The invention of the idea of a Blue Moon is attributed to Henry Porter Trefethen (1887 - 1957), editor of the *Maine Farmers’ Almanac*. He used the ‘third-full-moon-in-a-season’ definition. This is known as the Maine Rule for designating Blue Moons. A later corruption of Trefethen’s idea gave us the ‘second-full-moon-in-a-month’ definition, which is by far the most popular one these days. The third definition requires a situation when atmospheric conditions are just right, with lots of volcanic or forest fire dust and ash at high altitude. Then the moon can actually turn blue. This is a very rare, unpredictable event and the moon does not have to be full. This is a phenomenon of weather on earth and has nothing to do with the moon.

HIDDEN GEMS OF VAL-DES-MONTS....

We all know Val-des-Monts, the Municipality where we spend much of our leisure time, as a land of idyllic lakes and forests, filled with the wonders of nature and amazing neighbours. However, there is another side to Val-des-Monts, one filled with incredible stories and history – and even some mysteries. Here is one example:



Last year's newsletter featured a report on Val-des-Monts' only Buddhist monastery, right in our neighbourhood! Buddhism, however, was not the first religion to call this idyllic spot home. Trek up to the monastery's main grounds, located at 11 chemin Katimavik, just off route du Carrefour, take a peek through the trees, and you will get a glimpse of the property's past.

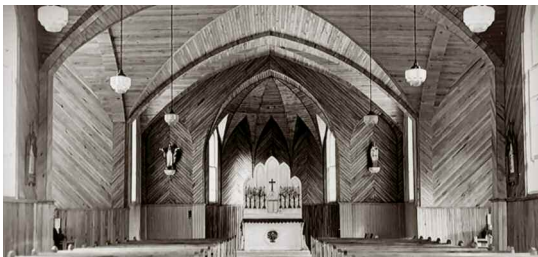
Back in the early 1900s, a Catholic order called the Oblates owned the property, which was used as a religious retreat – more than 300 members came here in the summer to worship, meditate, and also to enjoy canoeing and hiking on beautiful lac McGregor. The priests themselves built buildings,

paths and roads that still exist today on the land.



The "crown jewel" was the wooden chapel. It's boarded up now, but this early photograph of the interior (below) shows how magnificent it was.

On the hillside surrounding the chapel, the priests built stations of the cross. The final and largest



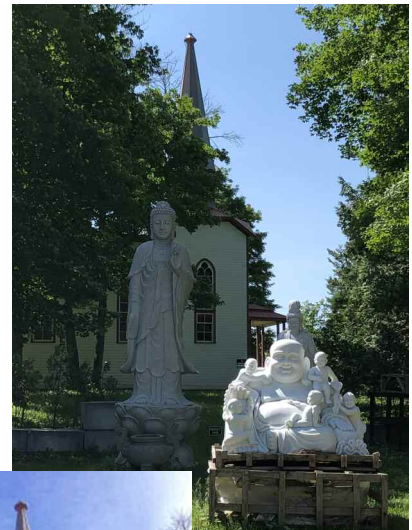
cross was three trees high and could be seen from all around the countryside. Time has mostly eroded the trails but hikers can still find some of the stone steps and bits

of fallen lumber, wire and nails from the crosses that marked the trail.

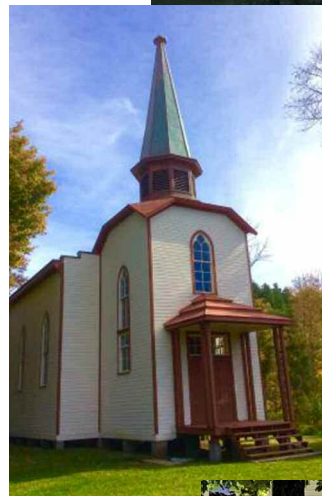
In 1968, the Order sold the property to a professor, Louis-Charles Veilleux, who founded and ran Camp Katimavik, an education centre for children. For 25 years, kids came from all around to learn how to swim, sail, hike, and even ride horses. Sadly, when the Municipality expropriated the land to build route du Carrefour, the camp was forced to close because it was too dangerous for the campers to cross the busy road to get to the lake.

The camp closed in 1990, and the property was reincarnated as the Pho Da Son Buddhist Monastery we see today. However, the original chapel still stands adjacent to the monastery's grounds, and is currently for sale. It will be interesting to follow the next chapter in its long and storied history.

ENVIRONMENT

FISH STOCKING

Fishing stocking is an important service to our members and the funding for this is shared between the Association's budget allocation and private contributions from anglers from our lakes. We are working to determine the exact breakdown and will have more news by the AGM.

The Environment Committee continues to control and manage fish stocking throughout our lakes. There is a risk of environmental damage if individuals bring fish in from outside lakes. Invasive aquatic plants and organisms can be accidentally introduced to our waters and devastate our lakes' ecology, not to mention your home and cottage property values.

In Québec, different types of bait can be used to catch fish. However, there are some restrictions on the use and possession of certain types of bait. Live bait fish (which includes fish, mollusks, crustaceans – e.g., shrimp, crayfish; and marine animals and their parts – e.g., eggs, sperm, roe, spawn, larvae, spat or offspring of these animals) is prohibited throughout Québec at all times. Earthworms, leeches and frogs are not considered to be bait fish, and their use as bait is therefore permitted unless otherwise indicated.

ANNUAL WATER TESTING

The Environment Committee and other volunteers completed testing of phosphate levels in our lakes in May 2019. Testing for *E. coli* occurred in August 2018. Overall, the results for our lakes continue to be very good. The detailed results for all the test sites on the nine lakes will be distributed at the AGM and are also available on our website, www.psl.ca. If you have a boat and are willing to help with water testing, let us know.

ANNUAL TREE DISTRIBUTION

In the spring, trees (saplings) were made available to lake associations via the Federation of Lakes of Val-des-Monts. Interested in receiving free trees for your lakefront property next year? Instructions will be posted on our website, www.psl.ca. Availability of tree species may vary from year to year.

Good fishing – and don't forget your permit!

REFUSE COLLECTION – DO YOUR PART!

MUNICIPAL BY-LAW 820-18 As of June 30, 2018, all residents must use a wheeled garbage bin with a maximum capacity of 360 litres (like the model shown at right), available at hardware stores. It is illegal to keep, on your property or along Municipal roads, old garbage containers which cannot be used for garbage collection, which may result in fines. Garbage will be collected every other week, alternating with recyclables.

DO YOU KNOW THE MUNICIPAL REGULATIONS?

FIRE REGULATIONS

Since April 8 of this year, the Fire Safety Department has been conducting residential visits in Districts 1, 2 and 3 (our area) as part of its fire prevention program. During their visits, firefighters check residences for compliance with the Municipal regulations for issue 16-RM-05 – to enact fire prevention measures. They ensure that:

1. A minimum of one smoke alarm is present on each floor.
2. A minimum of one approved carbon monoxide alarm is installed in each single-family residence or in each dwelling, when a combustion device is installed inside the residence or when a parking garage is located inside the residence (incorporated or contiguous) and when this garage is an integral part of the residence or dwelling.
3. A 2.2 kg (5 lb.) portable ABC powder extinguisher is present.
4. A clearance of one metre is maintained around the electrical panel.
5. Your civic number is visible from the traffic lane.
6. Chimney sweeping is done at least once a year.



We remind you that burning permits (one metre and more) and fireworks permits (mandatory at all times) are available from the Municipality. The best way to fight fire is through prevention.



FIRE SAFETY

Summer evenings around the fire are a time to be enjoyed. But...

Do you have your permit to be able to make open fires?

In accordance with article 10.2 of by-law 16-RM-05 to enact fire safety standards, open fires are allowed under certain conditions, with a burning permit issued by the Municipality.

Burning permit: \$15, valid for a period of 30 days.

Depending on the weather conditions, the fires may be prohibited. To find out if this is the case, you can visit the Municipality's website, www.val-des-monts.net, or check the road signs of the SOPFEU present on the Municipality's territory.

TEMPORARY SHELTERS

Temporary shelters are only allowed between October 15 and April 15.

The Municipality has included this information with the property owners' tax bill and it intends to enforce the rulings and apply substantial fines. **Remember – ignorance of the law is no excuse!**

Common Loon Facts: Loons are able to dive to depths of up to 200 feet, for a duration of up to five minutes, in search of food. They find their prey by sight and prefer clear lakes where they can spot their prey through the water. Loons sport their famous red eyes only in summer. The red coloration is thought to help it identify other loons from far away, and may even aid the bird in seeing underwater. In the winter, the eyes become dull in color. The placement of a loon's legs at the far back of the body means that they cannot easily walk on land. This difficulty is one reason why a loon's nest is built right next to the water. Male loons are in charge of choosing nesting territory, and will defend their territory aggressively from other loons. Loons prefer to build their nests on areas completely surrounded by water, such as islands or emergent vegetation.
